SECTION OVERVIEW:

As a parish leader, you have the most important job in the world. The entire story of salvation history, the Gospel message, has been handed to you to make present in the lives of those in your parish and community. Even in a world that seems to have lost its way, the Gospel has not lost its relevancy and impact. However, for us to embark on the "New Evangelization" that St. John Paul II called us to, with its new expression, ardor, and methods, we will have to learn to regather our parish communities around this central mission of evangelization.

In this foundational Revive course, we will first learn the content of this message that changes the world and how to express it to change the hearts of those around us. We will unpack the seven habits of highly effective evangelists, as well as disciplines that we need to develop in our personal lives to become more impactful in sharing this mission. Finally, we will learn a few practical, "stubbornly simple" methods for doing the work of evangelization in our parishes.

Today, the obstacles to evangelization are unlike any others we have faced in history. We live in an era where evangelization means trying to share the Good News with people who worship nothing at all. However, in the midst of all this, the Good News is still Good News because the Gospel, which is Jesus Christ, solves every problem in the human heart.

SECTION OVERVIEW:

It has been said, "The Church does not so much have a mission, as the Church is a mission." That mission, the raison d'être for the Catholic Church, is summarized in the Great Commission in Matthew 28, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

Jesus Christ was sent by the Father to bring all of humanity back into a relationship with Him. In order to accomplish this mission in every place and in every era, Jesus established a Church, gathered around this mission. If the Church has been sent in this way, as the Bride of Christ, then so has your parish in a particular way been established to make disciples.

How do Catholics and parish leaders live out this Great Commission to make disciples? By proclaiming the primary message of the Gospel, or the *kerygma*. In this section, Chris delves into the roots of the word *kerygma*, inviting you individually and as a parish to

become a *keryx*, or herald, and gives the five headline points that make up the *kerygma*, noting that the *kerygma* is the love story that makes everything else in the Catholic Faith come alive for the modern world. Without it, the Faith appears to be a list of rules. But gathered around this proclamation, you, your parish, and the world can be transformed

In this section, Chris argues that real renewal will come to our parishes when we go back to keeping the "Main Thing"—this call to evangelize—as the actual main thing, and it will come when we prioritize it as the core message for everyone we encounter: those in our pews and those who have left. By revealing how the New Testament displays the kerygmatic backdrop to everything we do as a Church, Chris shows how the message of the *kerygma* is a deeply Catholic one and how, by framing our ministry around the *kerygma*, we can chart a way forward for ministry in a post-Christian world.



"On the lips of the catechist the first proclamation must ring out over and over: "Jesus Christ loves you; he gave his life to save you; and now he is living at your side every day to enlighten, strengthen and free you." This first proclamation is called "first" not because it exists at the beginning and can then be forgotten or replaced by other more important things. It is first in a qualitative sense because it is the principal proclamation, the one which we must hear again and again in different ways, the one which we must announce one way or another throughout the process of catechesis, at every level and moment."

SECTION OVERVIEW:

Evangelization is always a "life-on-life" enterprise and happens in the context of relationships. Each *keryx* or herald, speaks to another soul of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In this section, Chris lays out a foundation of seven habits of highly effective evangelists, and each chapter unpacks one of these important principles. He challenges us with these seven principles for how we can begin to habitually evangelize in our daily lives without seeming "sales-y." Every Catholic, by beginning to live out these seven principles, can begin to naturally develop daily habits of evangelization. There are 1.2 billion Catholics in the world; imagine if all of them were living this way day-in and day-out.

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Habit #1: Keep First Things First

CHALLENGE: The next time you are in a parish staff meeting (large or small) pray together and speak the name Jesus out loud. Talk about Him as if He is a real person working on your team and in your lives.

Habit #2: Make Time

CHALLENGE: As a parish staff person or volunteer, do you find that evangelization is becoming something that you do "for your job" or in your ministry but not in your daily life? Take someone whom you have been meaning to invest in out for lunch or coffee and ask what God is doing in their life.

Habit #3: Present the Faith as a Celebration of Life

• How can you live as an individual in a way that shows that the Faith is a celebration of life? If you struggle to celebrate, what can you do with your family, friends, or team to celebrate life in the context of faith? How do you personally like to celebrate? Over a meal? Do you like to hike? Have someone over for a drink and good conversation? Throw a get-together? Make family dinner extra special and invite Jesus into it? Write down how you like to celebrate and make note of opportunities to do so in your day-to-day life.

Ok. Let's get practical. What are some things your parish can start focusing on to do the work of evangelization? Chris's point is pretty simple; what works has not changed from the time of Christ, it's just about actually doing it well!

The most legendary pizza place in New York City is called Lucali. It is in Brooklyn. It is only open from 5:45 p.m. to 11 p.m. every night and people wait between two and four hours to eat. Every. Single. Evening.

Why is Lucali so popular? The owner, Mark Iacono, has no culinary experience and there are plenty of pizza spots in NYC. Why wait for hours? They make only two things: pizza and calzones. They do both incredibly well. Using the simplest ingredients, they craft a pizza experience that is unlike any other.

Large group evangelization events. Small group discipleship. Empowering parishioners to live the Gospel in your community. That was the method of Jesus and it still works today . . . if we do it! Simple does not mean it's easy, but we also do not have to overcomplicate the process to evangelize well.

These three elements mutually feed one another. After a large evangelistic event, invite people to continue growing in small groups. Then, eventually, you can invite small groups to serve together in the community.

Do the basics and do them well. That is Chris's vision for a renewed emphasis on evangelization in our parishes.




